Scope

The RLP is at the heart of the community delivering an inclusive education to pupils of all ages. Our mission is to embrace challenges and to celebrate success in all that we do by striving for every learner to reach their full potential. The culture that we have in our schools means that they each retain their distinctiveness but learn and grow together and remain collectively responsible for providing all pupils with exciting and inspiring opportunities.

Roles and Responsibilities

Parental Responsibilities

- Parents/Carers are expected to ensure that their child attends school regularly, punctually, properly dressed, equipped and in a fit condition to learn.
- Parents/Carers of registered students/pupils have a legal duty under the Education Act 1996 to ensure that children of compulsory school age attend school on a regular and full-time basis.
- Parents/Carers are responsible for informing the school of the reason for any absence (by letter, email, phone call, text or personal visit), on each day of absence.
- Parents/Carers can expect the school to keep them fully informed of their child's progress.
- Parents/Carers should avoid, if at all possible, making medical/dental appointments for pupils during school hours.
- Parents/Carers should avoid booking holidays during term time.

Pupil Responsibilities

- All pupils are expected to attend school. All pupils are expected to be punctual to school. Pupils are expected to be ready to learn.

School Responsibilities

- Ensure a legal register is taken at designated times during the school day (a.m. and p.m.).
- Keep accurate records relating to pupil attendance and monitor data closely to ensure appropriate communications and intervention work is implemented where necessary.
- Provide pupils with a safe and stimulating educational environment.
- Ensure that the attendance policy is shared with parents when their child starts the school and share the policy on the school website
- Support and communicate with parents/carers regarding attendance issues on a whole-school level and on an individual basis. Promptly responding to any issues which may lead to non-attendance.
- Be sensitive to the needs of individual parents/carers in the way in which attendance issues are addressed, recognising family circumstances.
- Work in close partnership with the school's Attendance Improvement Officer.
- Adhere to Hertfordshire County Council guidance on Penalty Notices as per section 444 of the Education Act 1996.

The Heads in each school in the Trust have overall responsibility for the attendance in their schools and for liaising with the Governors, to whom a report on attendance will be made termly. The general responsibility for daily implementation of the policy at Dundale lies with the Headteacher.

Governor and Trustee Responsibilities

- To ensure that the importance of attendance is made clear by promoting the relevant school policies and guidance directed at parents and staff.

- Annually review the school's attendance policy and rules and ensure that all provisions are in place to allow school staff, parents and children to implement these effectively.
- Ensure there is a named senior manager to lead on attendance.
- Ensure that all legislation regarding attendance is complied with, and that up-to-date guidelines are communicated to parents, children and staff.
- Work out appropriate and accurate annual attendance numbers and future attendance targets and submit all necessary attendance data to external agencies as required.
- Take time at governors' meetings to regularly receive and discuss attendance issues that have arisen in order to stay on top of expected attendance targets for the year.
- Ensure that the school is implementing effective means of recording attendance and organising that data, including for children who are educated off-site.
- Ensure that they are clear on how to analyse attendance data and how to communicate the findings effectively to parents and staff.
- Ensure that senior leaders make the necessary referrals to external agencies as required.
- Use any data gathered to devise solutions to problems, make the proper adjustments to attendance coordination and target set for the future.

Monitoring Attendance

Dundale Primary School

Responsibility for day-to-day monitoring of attendance is that of classroom teachers, Phase Leaders, office staff, and Headteacher. Class Teachers should ensure that registers are accurately completed as they are **a legal record and are used for health and safety purposes** and should be kept for a minimum of date +3 years.

LGBs receive updates on attendance via the Headteacher's reports.

Introduction and Background

The RLP recognises that positive behaviour and good attendance are essential in order for pupils to get the most of their school experience, including their attainment, wellbeing and wider life chances.

The law entitles every child of compulsory school age to an efficient, full-time education suitable to their age, aptitude, and any special educational need they may have. It is the legal responsibility of every parent to make sure their child receives that education either by attendance at a school or by education otherwise than at a school.

Where parents decide to have their child registered at school, they have an additional legal duty to ensure their child attends that school regularly, on time. This means their child must attend every day that the school is open, except in a small number of allowable circumstances such as being too ill to attend or being given permission for an absence in advance from the school.

The Department for Education (DfE) has produced statutory guidance for maintained schools, academies, independent schools, and local authorities. It is called “[Working together to improve school attendance](#)” and it includes a National Framework in relation to absence and the use of legal sanctions. Our School Attendance Policy reflects the requirements and principles of that guidance.

This policy is written with the above guidance in mind and underpins our school ethos to:

- Promote children’s welfare and safeguarding;
- Ensure every pupil has access to the full-time education to which they are entitled;
- Ensure that pupils succeed whilst at school;
- Ensure that pupils have access to the widest possible range of opportunities at school, and when they leave school.

It has been developed in consultation with school governors, teachers, local Headteacher Associations, the Local Authority and parents and carers. It seeks to ensure that all parties involved in the practicalities of school attendance are aware and informed of attendance matters in school and to outline the school’s commitment to attendance being everyone’s responsibility. It details the responsibilities of individuals and groups involved and the procedures in place to promote and monitor pupil attendance.

In addition, all schools follow the DfE’s statutory safeguarding guidance, Keeping Children Safe in Education, which emphasises the importance of understanding the potential vulnerabilities of children who are missing or absent from education.

Our policy aims to raise and maintain levels of attendance by:

- Promoting a positive and welcoming atmosphere in which pupils feel safe, secure, and valued.
- Raising and maintaining a whole school awareness of the importance of good attendance and punctuality.
- Ensuring that attendance is monitored effectively and reasons for absences are recorded promptly and consistently.

For our children to gain the greatest benefit from their education it is vital that they attend regularly and be at school, on time, every day the school is open unless the reason for the absence is unavoidable. It is a rule of this school that pupils must attend every day, unless there are exceptional circumstances, and it is the headteacher, not the parent, who can authorise the absence.

Promoting Regular Attendance

All the schools in the RLP believe in developing good patterns of attendance and set high expectations for the attendance and punctuality for all our pupils from the outset. It is a central part of RLP's vision, values, ethos and day to day life. We recognise the strong connections between attendance, attainment, safeguarding and wellbeing.

Helping to create a pattern of regular attendance is the responsibility of parents, pupils and all members of school staff.

To help us all to focus on this, we will:

- Submit a daily attendance return to the Department of Education, in line with the legal expectations placed on all schools.
- Build strong relationships and work jointly with families.
- Give parents/carers details on attendance in our newsletters.
- Promote the benefits of high attendance.
- Accurately complete admission and attendance registers and have effective day to day processes in place to follow-up absence as required by law.
- Report to parents/carers regularly on their child's attendance and the impact on their progress.
- Contact parents/carers should their child's attendance fall below the school's target for attendance (see Annex A for procedures).

Understanding Types of Absence

Any absence affects the routine of a child's schooling and regular absence will seriously affect their learning journey and ability to progress. Any pupil's absence or late arrival disrupts teaching routines and so may affect the learning of others in the same class. Ensuring a child's regular attendance at school is a parental responsibility and allowing absence from school, without a good reason, creates an offence in law and may result in prosecution.

Every half-day absence from school has to be classified by the school (not by the parent), as either **authorised** or **unauthorised**. This is why information about the cause of any absence is always required. Each half-day is known as a 'session'.

Authorised absences are morning or afternoon sessions away from school for a genuine reason such as illness (although you may be asked to provide medical evidence for your child before this can be authorised), medical or dental appointments which unavoidably fall in school time, emergencies or other unavoidable causes.

Unauthorised absences are those which the school does not consider reasonable and for which no 'leave' has been granted. This type of absence can lead to the school referring to the Local Authority for penalty notices and/or legal proceedings.

Unauthorised absence includes, (however this list is not exhaustive):

- parents/carers keeping children off school unnecessarily e.g. because they had a late night or for non-infectious illness or injury that would not affect their ability to learn.
- absences which have never been properly explained.
- children who arrive at school after the close of registration are marked using a 'U'. This indicates that they are in school for safeguarding purposes, however, is counted as an absence for the session.
- shopping trips.
- looking after other children or children accompanying siblings or parents to medical appointments.
- their own or family birthdays.
- holidays taken during term time, not deemed 'for exceptional purposes' by the headteacher, including any arranged by other family members or friends.
- day trips.
- other leave of absence in term time which has not been agreed.

Persistent Absenteeism (PA) and Severe Absenteeism (SA)

A pupil is defined by the Government as a '**persistent absentee**' when they miss 10% or more schooling across the school year for any reason; this can be authorised or unauthorised absence. Absence at this level will cause considerable damage to any pupil's education and we need the full support and cooperation of parents to resolve this. All pupils who have attendance levels of 90% or below are considered to be a persistent absentee.

A pupil who has missed 50% or more schooling is defined by the Government as '**severely absent**'. Pupils within this cohort may find it more difficult to be in school or face bigger barriers to their regular attendance and, as such, are likely to need more intensive support.

Absence Procedures

We monitor and review all pupils' absences, and the reasons that are given, thoroughly.

If a child is absent from school the parent must follow these procedures:

- Contact the school via the School Gateway, email admin@dundale.herts.sch.uk or telephone 01442 822421 on the first day of absence before 9.15 am, when our registers close;
- The school has an answer phone available to leave a message if nobody is available to take your call. Please be aware that, if you leave a voicemail to report your child's absence, you may receive a call from the school so that we may discuss the absence before making a decision as to whether the absence is to be recorded as authorised.
- Contact the school on every further day of absence, again before 9.15 am;
- Ensure that your child returns to school as soon as possible and you provide any medical evidence, if requested, to support the absence. Medical evidence may be requested *where schools have reasonable doubt as to the authenticity of the absences or where absence due*

to illness has been frequent) where your child is having multiple periods of absence which are reported as being due to medical reasons. When determining whether a child is too ill to attend school, both parents and school staff can consider the advice contained within the NHS Guidance on School Absence and Childhood Illness see Annex D.

If your child is absent, we will:

- Telephone or text you on the first, and every subsequent day of absence, if we have not heard from you. However, it is the parent/carer's responsibility to contact us.
- If we are unable to make contact with parents by telephone, we will telephone emergency contact numbers, send texts or emails and a home visit may be made, in the interests of safeguarding. *The school reserves the right to contact emergency services if we do not get any response from parents or carers and we feel a child may be at risk*
- *The Local Authority will be informed if no contact has been made with parent/carers by the 10th day of absence (or sooner if deemed appropriate) as The School Attendance (student Registration) (England) Regulations 2024 Section 13 requires schools to inform the local authority of any pupils absent from school and where absences amount to more than 10 or more **days**, either consecutively or irregularly and have been unauthorised. This means school will have unauthorised 20 am/pm sessions of absences. Schools are also under a safeguarding duty, under **section 175 of the Education Act 2002** to investigate any unexplained/unauthorised absences.*

At this point your child will be considered to be "absent from education".

If absence continues, we will:

- Contact you if your child's attendance falls below 95% or has 3 different absence periods and/or where punctuality is a concern.
- Arrange a meeting so that we can discuss the situation and the reasons for the absences from school - please see Annex A for school flow chart routines.
- Consider whether any reasonable adjustments are required
- Offer a Families First Assessment if felt appropriate
- Create a personalised robust support plan, such as an attendance contract, to address any barriers to attendance and make clear each person's role in improving the attendance patterns of your child.
- Offer signposting support to other agencies or services, if appropriate.
- Seek advice, guidance and support from the Local Authority Statutory Attendance Support Team and consider appropriate legal sanctions, if attendance deteriorates following the above actions.

Lateness

Poor punctuality is not acceptable and can sometimes lead to irregular school attendance patterns. Good timekeeping is a vital life skill which will help children as they progress through their school life and out into the wider world. Pupils who arrive late disrupt lessons and, if a child misses the start of the day, they can feel unsettled and embarrassed and risk missing vital work and important messages from their class teacher.

The times of the start and close of the school day for all pupils at Dundale Primary School are as follows:

- Doors open at 8.30 am (8.35am for Reception)
- Registration starts and doors close at 8.45 am - all children should be in classrooms for 8.45am
- Registers close at 9:15 am
- The school day ends at 3.15 pm (3.10pm for Reception)

The timings above represent the normal operating procedures, however this may be adjusted in the following instances:

- A special school event (For example a sports day or trip) or exceptional circumstance (due to travel disruption)
- Where there has been a pre-agreed adjustment to the school day timings for a pupil due to exceptional circumstances linked to specific instances (such as medical), however this should always be for a specified time period and reviewed
- A specific situation of exceptional circumstance for a specific pupil on a unique instance

How we manage lateness:

Pupils arriving after 8:45 am are required to come into school via the school office with a parent/carer. The parent will be asked to sign the pupil in and give a reason for the late arrival, which is recorded on the attendance register.

At 9.15am the registers will be closed. In accordance with regulations, if your child arrives after that time, they will receive a mark that shows them to be on site – ‘U’, but this will **not** count as a present mark and it will mean that they have an unauthorised absence; The school may contact parents/carers regarding punctuality concerns.

If your child has a persistent lateness record, you may be asked to meet with a member of the leadership team but you can approach us at any time if you are having difficulties getting your child to school on time. We expect parents and staff to encourage good punctuality by being good role models to our children and, as a school, we celebrate good punctuality. Unauthorised lateness could result in the school seeking advice and guidance from the Local Authority.

Leaving and returning to School during the School Day

If a pupil needs to leave the school during the school day the following procedures must be adhered to:

- 1) Parent/carer must advise the school office for any pupil needing to leave the school during the day for medical/other appointments, informing them of the timings. Pupils should attend school before and after their appointment as appropriate.
- 2) A note will be added to the register so the teacher can view the appointment and allow the pupil to leave the class as required
- 3) A parent or carer must report to the school office to collect the pupil for their appointment
- 4) After leaving the class the pupil must go to the school office to be signed-out.

On returning to school the pupil must visit the school office with their parent/carer to sign in so the school office can provide this information in the event of a fire drill

Reduced Timetable

For a pupil who has a reduced timetable, (meaning that they are not educated full time on the school site) the school has a responsibility to submit a reduced timetable form to the Local Authority. This form has to be agreed by both the school and the parents and then by the Local Authority. This is a short-term measure and strategies will be put in place to increase pupils back to a full-time time timetable.

Understanding barriers to attendance

Whilst any child may occasionally have time off school because they are too unwell to attend, sometimes they can be reluctant to attend school. Any barriers preventing regular attendance are best resolved between the school, the parents, and the child. If a parent thinks their child is reluctant to attend school, then we will work with that family to understand the root problem and provide any necessary support. We can consider a Families First Assessment, use outside agencies to help with this, such as the School Nurse, Mental Health and Emotional Wellbeing support services, or the relevant Local Authority team/s. Where outside agencies are supporting the family, you may be invited to attend a Team Around the Family meeting (TAF) to consider what is working well and what needs to improve. An individual support plan will be agreed and subsequently reviewed.

Some pupils face greater barriers to attendance than their peers. These can include pupils who suffer from long-term medical conditions or who have special educational needs and disabilities, or other vulnerabilities. High expectations of attendance remain in place for these pupils; however, we will work with families and pupils to support improved attendance whilst being mindful of the additional barriers faced. We can discuss reasonable adjustments and additional support from external partners, where appropriate.

Under the DfE's statutory guidance, schools are required to submit a sickness return to the Local Authority for all pupils who have missed/are likely to miss 15 or more school days (consecutive or cumulative) due to medical reasons/illness.

Local Authority Attendance Support Team

Local Authority Attendance Support Specialists work strategically by offering support to schools, to reduce persistent absence and improve overall attendance.

Parents/Carers are expected to work with the school and local authority to address any attendance concerns. Parents/Carers should proactively engage with the support offered, aiming to resolve any problems together. This is nearly always successful. If difficulties cannot be resolved in this way, the school may consider more formal support and/or refer the child to the Local Authority. If attendance does not improve, legal action may be taken which may be in the form of a Penalty Notice (see Annex C for the Hertfordshire Code of

Conduct) or other legal options available to the Local Authority such as prosecution in the Magistrates Court.

School Attendance and the Law

Legislation was passed, The School Attendance (student Registration) (England) Regulations 2024 which introduced a National Framework in England. By law all children of compulsory school age must receive an appropriate full-time education (Education Act 1996). Parents/Carers have a legal duty to ensure their child attends school regularly at the school at which they are registered.

Parents/Carers may be recognised differently under education law, than under family law. Section 576 of the Education Act 1996 states that a 'parent', in relation to a child or young person, includes any person who is not a parent (from which can be inferred 'biological parent') but who has parental responsibility, or who has care of the child.

A person typically has care of a child or young person if they are the person with whom the child lives, either full or part time and who looks after the child, irrespective of what their biological or legal relationship is with the child.

National Framework for Penalty Notices

There is now a single consistent national threshold for when a penalty notice must be considered by all schools in England, of 10 sessions (usually equivalent to 5 school days) of unauthorised absence within a rolling 10 school week period. The 10 sessions of absence do not have to be consecutive and can be made up of a combination of any type of unauthorised absence (G, O and/or U coded within the school's registers). The 10-school week period can span different terms, school years or education settings.

Sanctions may include issuing each parent (for each child) with a Penalty Notice for £160, reduced to £80 if paid within 21 days (for the first offence). A second Penalty Notice issued within a three-year period will result in a fine of £160 per parent, per child. If a third offence is committed the matter may be referred to the local authority for consideration of prosecution via the Magistrates Court. If prosecution is instigated for irregular school attendance, each parent/carer may receive a fine of up to £2500 and/or up to 3 months in prison. If a parent/carer is found guilty in court, they will receive a criminal conviction.

See Annex C for the Hertfordshire Code of Conduct.

There is no entitlement in law for pupils to take time off during the term to go on holiday or other absence for the purpose of leisure or recreation, or to take part in protest activity in school hours. In addition, the Supreme Court has ruled that the definition of regular school attendance is "in accordance with the rules prescribed by the school."

The School Attendance (student Registration) (England) Regulations 2024 set out the statutory requirements for schools. All references to family holidays and extended leave have been removed. The amendments specify that headteachers may not grant any leave of

absence during term time unless there are "exceptional circumstances" and they do not have any discretion to authorise up to ten days of absence each academic year.

For all pupils in the RLP, a leave of absence shall not be granted in term time unless there are reasons considered to be exceptional by the headteacher, irrespective of the child's overall attendance. Only the headteacher or their designate (not the local authority) may authorise such a request, and all applications for a leave of absence must be made in writing, in advance, on the appropriate provided by the school. This can be found on the school website [here](#).

The school will usually consider that the parent who has made the application is therefore allowing the leave of absence, and that all parents who are on the holiday are allowing the leave. Where a parent removes a child after their application for leave was refused or where no application was made to the school, the absence will be recorded as unauthorised. It is likely that penalty notices will be requested, in line with the National Framework and Hertfordshire Code of Conduct, in respect of each parent believed to have allowed the absence.

For pupils in the RLP 'exceptional circumstances' will be interpreted as follows:

The fundamental principles for defining 'exceptional' are events that are "rare, significant, unavoidable and short". By 'unavoidable' we mean an event that could not reasonably be scheduled at another time, outside of school term time, regardless of who has planned or paid for the holiday or absence (including grandparents or other family or friends).

The headteacher/school may discuss the leave of absence request with other education settings and/or the Local Authority to determine any exceptional circumstances.

Deletion from Roll

For any pupil leaving Dundale Primary School and Nursery other than at the end of year 6, parents/carers are required to email or write to the school with the following information: Child's name, class, current address, date of leaving, new home address, name of new school, address of new school. This information is essential to ensure that we know the whereabouts and may appropriately safeguard all our pupils, even those who leave us.

It is crucial that parents/carers keep school updated with current addresses and contact details for the pupil and key family members, in case of emergency.

Under **The School Attendance (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2024**, all schools are legally required to notify their Local Authority of every new entry to the admission register within five days of the pupil being enrolled. In addition to this, every deletion from the school register must also be notified to the Local Authority, as soon as the ground for deletion has been

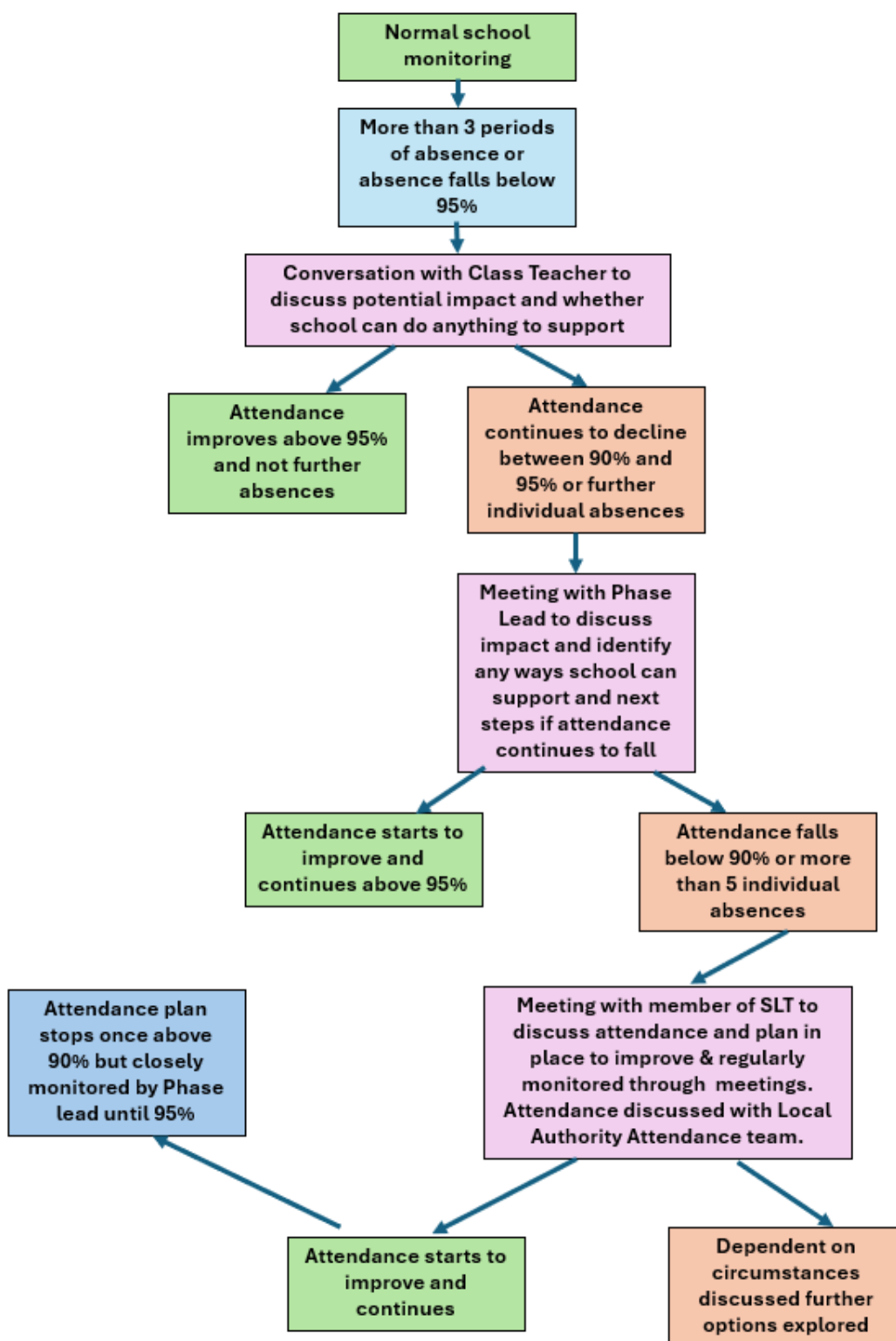
met in relation to that pupil, and in any event no later than the time at which the pupil's name is deleted from the register. This duty does not apply when a pupil's name is removed from the admission register at a standard transition point – when the pupil has completed the final year of education normally provided by that school.

Absence data

We use data to monitor, identify and support individual pupils or groups of pupils when their attendance needs to improve, and schools are required to submit pupil attendance data to the Department for Education on a daily basis Education (Information about Individual students) (England) (Amendment) Regulations 2024. Persistently and severely absent pupils are tracked and monitored carefully. We also combine this with academic tracking, as increased absence affects attainment.

We share information and work collaboratively with other schools in the area, local authorities, and other partners, when absence is at risk of becoming persistent or severe.

Work with the school and local authority to help them understand their child's barriers to attendance. Proactively engage with the support offered to prevent the need for more formal support. Where out of school barriers are identified, signpost and support access to any required services in the first instance and act as lead practitioner if attendance is the only issue and/or the local threshold for formal early help is not met. If a case meets the local threshold for formal early help/family support, this includes conducting the early help assessment and acting as the lead practitioner where all partners agree that the school is the best placed lead service. Where the lead practitioner is outside of the school, continue to work with the local authority and partners. If the issue persists, and there are multiple needs consider whether the threshold for early help is met and facilitate access where it is. Regardless, take an active part in the multi-agency effort with the school and other partners. Provide the lead practitioner in cases where threshold is met and all partners agree that a local authority service is best placed to lead. Where the lead practitioner is outside of the local authority, continue to work with the school and partners.

Code B Modification: Clarify that Code B is now strictly defined as "*Attending any other approved educational activity*" (replacing "Educated off-site") and requires formal school supervision.

Introduction of Sub-Codes: Note the mandatory separation of standard codes into sub-codes to monitor specific barriers:

- **Code C1:** Leave of absence for regulated performances or employment abroad.
- **Code C2:** Compulsory school-age pupils on a pre-agreed reduced/part-time timetable.
